Psalm 2ⁱⁱⁱ Struggle on the World's Stage

¹Why are the nations in an uproar? * Why do the peoples mutter empty threats? ²Why do the kings of the earth rise up in revolt, and the princes plot together, * against the LORD and against his Anointed? ³"Let us break their yoke," they say; * "let us cast off their bonds from us." ⁴He whose throne is in heaven is laughing; * the LORD has them in derision. ⁵Then he speaks to them in his wrath, * and his rage fills them with terror. 6"I myself have set my king * upon my holy hill of Zion." ⁶Let me announce the decree of the LORD: * he said to me, "You are my Son; this day have I begotten you. 'Ask of me, and I will give you the nations for your inheritance * and the ends of the earth for your possession. ⁸You shall crush them with an iron rod * and shatter them like a piece of pottery." ⁹And now, you kings, be wise; * be warned, you rulers of the earth. ¹⁰Submit to the Lord with fear, * and with trembling bow before him; ¹¹Lest he be angry and you perish; * for his wrath is quickly kindled. ¹²Happy are they all * who take refuge in him!

This psalm is a divine affirmation of the Jewish king. Amidst the rebellion of other kings (vv. 1-3), God reaffirms the choice (vv. 4-6) and adoption of the king as God's son (v. 7) in order to establish God's rule over the nations (vv. 8-9). The psalm ends with a warning to the kings of the nations to submit to God and "serve the LORD" or expect God's wrath (vv. 10-11). Christians have applied this psalm to Christ, the "anointed" one of God (v. 2).
